In the meantime, we would like to add our support to four legislative reforms that

- Foreign Investment Act amendments (passed by House, pending 2nd R in Senate)
 Public Services Act amendments (passed by House, pending CR in Senate)
- 3. Retail Trade Act amendments (passed by House, pending CR in Senate)
- 4. Open Access in Data Transmission bill (pending CR in House)
- In the absence of amendments to the foreign equity restrictions in the Constitution, the above reforms would substantially demonstrate to the foreign investment community a Philippine commitment to structural reform in the country's foreign investment regime. Among 69 countries included in the OECD FDI Regulatory Restrictiveness Index, the Philippines is rated last and most restrictive at 69th.

In addition, the policy of reducing FDI restrictions, expressed in Point #3 of the Socioeconomic Agenda in May 2016, would be partially fulfilled with their enactment.

The 11th Foreign Investment Negative List (FINL) (EO 64) issued October 28, 2018 contained very limited "tweaks," in the words of then-Secretary Pernia. The FINL for which NEDA is the secretariat, was usually issued every two years, in order to record legal changes in regulated foreign ownership in the country.


